#### Sir Roderick's portrait unveiled

The University of Melbourne's Faculty of Business and Economics has announced a new Indigenous Pathway Program, developed in collaboration with Trinity College and the Faculty of Arts. Supported by a KPMG Bursary, it will give Indigenous BCom students financial support, academic and industry mentoring, and workplace experience opportunities. The successful BA(Extended) degree course for Indigenous students, largely developed by Trinity staff, is now completing its second full year.

The all-male a capella group, **Trinity Tiger Tones**, together with their female counterparts, **the Candystripes**, gave a hugely successful concert to a near capacity audience at BMW Edge, Federation Square, on 22 October. #### E Theatrical awards

Congratulations to 2010 Union Theatre Award-winners **Stella Charls (3rd year Arts)** (*right*) and **Simon Kennedy (TC 2007)**. The 2010 College play, *Twelve*, was also nominated for Production of the Year.

#### **2010** Inter-Collegiate results

It was a year of keen participation and all-round high achievement for Trinity in the 2010 Inter-Collegiate competitions. In the sporting arena, Trinity's women placed 3rd and the men came 4th, resulting in a combined 4th place overall. The Arts competition concluded with Trinity winning the Arts and Writing competition and placing 2nd in the final rankings for the Cultural Cup. Proving her staying ability in the fashion stakes, Alex was also first runner-up in the Derby Day competition.
